Governor Joseph E. Brennan today announced the appointment of Richard W. Oliver of Kennebunk as a member of the Maine State Commission on the Arts and Humanities.

Oliver, a former resident of Biddeford, has been an auctioneer and antique dealer in Kennebunk since 1970. From 1966 to 1969, Oliver served in the Navy and spent 18 months in Viet Nam, where he was awarded a Purple Heart.

Mr. Oliver has also served as a trustee of the Maine Criminal Justice Academy. He was instrumental in designing a course in antique identification and has taught courses in this subject.

Members of the Arts and Humanities Commission are recommended to the Governor as Maine citizens who are known for their competence and experience in connection with the artistic and cultural fields. The term of office is 3 years. One of the functions of the commission is to encourage and stimulate public interest and participation in the cultural heritage and programs of the State.
